Recycling Myth     Myth: My recycling doesn't actually get recycled.  Fact: Minnesota has robust recycling programming, and our residents recycle over 2 million tons of recycling each year! With more than 100 companies using recycled material in their products!	Recycling Myth     Myth: Any item with a recycling symbol can be recycled in a recycling bin.  Fact: The recycling symbol is not regulated and can be found on non-recyclable products. Always check with your city or county for recycling guidelines.  What plastic resin codes and plastic products are recyclable?  Merica Recycles Day November 15	Recycling Myth     Myth: If I don't know if something should be recycled, I should put it in the recycling bin just in case it can get recycled.  Fact: This is called 'wishcycling' and you should avoid it! If you don't know if something should go in the recycling, find out from your city or county and remember the phrase 'when in doubt, find out!'.
